You'll see a different look in the league this season as a number of franchise moves transpired during the off-season.

First, the National Champions Twin Cities Vulcans were purchase by Ted Baer and moved to Kerney, NE, where they will play as the Tri-City Storm.

Second, the Fargo-Moorhead Ice Sharks were purchased by an organization in Chicago that has moved the team to Bensenville, a Chicago suburb near the O'Hare Airport. They will play in a newly remodeled arena where the Chicago Blackhawks practice.



GDMISA Is Where It All Starts...

In 1984, the combined board of directors for the Des Moines Buccaneers Jr. "A" Hockey Team and the Des Moines Amateur Hockey Association took under consideration to oversee affairs of all groups associated with the Des Moines Ice Arena and the Des Moines Amateur Hockey Association. Thus, after months of planning, the Greater Des Moines Ice Sports Association was formed.

The Greater Des Moines Ice Sports Association (GDMISA) was organized for

the purpose of the advancement, coordination, and administration of educational and charitable programs relating to amateur hockey, ice sports, and related activities in the greater Des Moines area and the develop-



ment of abilities of members for participation in local, state, national and international events.

The GDMISA is a community resource dedicated to the promotion of amateur ice sports that owns and operates both the Metro Ice Sports Arena, located at 7201 Hickman Road and the Metro Ice Sports Facility, located at 5100 72nd Street.

There are five primary member divisions under the "umbrella" of the GDMISA: Amateur Youth Hockey, Senior Men's

Hockey, the Des Moines Figure Skating Club, the Des Moines Buccaneers Jr. "A" Hockey Team, and the Metro High School Hockey Division, which includes the Des Moines Capitals and the Des Moines Oak Leafs. Each of these groups has its own advisory board and is represented on the board of directors of GDMISA.

The Metro Ice Sports Arena and the Metro Ice Sports Facility are used not only by our member groups but also by the community at large, including the number one Therapeutic and Special Needs Program in the country, which serves over 1,000 children and adults each year. The Arena is also home of the Special Olympics ice skating programs and hosts their annual regional competition.

The GDMISA broke ground this last June for the construction of an additional sheet of ice at the Metro Ice Sports Facility. This \$2 million project is the latest step in the Association's commitment to provide quality ice skating facilities for the greater Des Moines community.

With the expansion of our facilities and programs, your support is needed more than ever. For more information about GDMISA and all the activities at both rinks, contact the office at 278-9757.







HISTORY Of the USHL



The league, originally formed as the Midwest Junior Hockey League in 1972, merged with the U.S. Hockey League in 1977 and with all juniors in 1979.

The USHL is a league for 16-21 year old players. Each of the teams play a 56 game league schedule starting in early September and finishing in mid-March. Upwards of 12 exhibition games against college teams, league playoffs, etc. augment each team's schedule to about 70 games.

Quality coaching and extensive amounts of practice and games provide a great training ground for potential college and pro players. The league has a voluntary draft system to help insure parity among the teams for season after season of keen competition. In most seasons, the league champion is not determined until the final weekend. The league attracts players from all over the USA from Maine to Alaska. Occasionally a foreign player receives eligibility to play.

In many respects the league helps players make the transition from high school hockey to college hockey. The extra year of intense playing experience and improving skill development, plus a year of physical growth and maturity are often very advantageous for developing players who are unsure of their abilities and potentials upon leaving high school.


The league games are constantly scouted by the NHL teams, NHL Central Scouting and Division 1 and 3 schools. Skill levels are evaluated and improvement throughout the year is followed.


Because playing junior hockey often involves a player having to move to the town of the team, the clubs help arrange housing and part time jobs. Community involvement by the players is encouraged by each club.

- 4. Provide players exposure to college and pro coaches.
- Further players educational goals while developing their hockey skills.
- Maintain a strictly amateur status with USA Hockey, NCAA, WCHA, ECAC, CCHA and other organizations.



BUCCANEER HISTORY



IN THE USHL

he USHL can trace its origins back to the Midwest Junior Hockey League that was formed in 1972. It merged with the old U.S. Hockey (Senior) League in 1977, and returned to competition with all juniors two years later.

Since that time, the USHL has been the nation's top league for players under the age of 21. The Des Moines Buccaneers joined the league for the 1980/81 season. Under the guidance of Coach/GM Ivan Prediger, the Bucs compiled a 23-25-0 record in their first season, which was good for second place behind Dubuque in the South Division.

Prediger led the team until November 1984, when former Bucs standout Jeff Ulrich filled in as an interim coach for several weeks until Jim Wiley took over the helm of the Bucs' ship in mid December. The team struggled through rough waters that season, winning just 7 games, until 1986/87 when they sailed to 23 wins.


Bob Ferguson took over the Buccaneers in the summer of 1990 after spending 9 years with the Sioux City Musketeers. After 3 consecutive years of leading the Bucs to second place regular season finishes, he made Buccaneer history by winning the regular season for the first time.

In 1991/92, Ferguson led the Buccaneers to their first ever National Championship. The team went on to win the regular season championship for a second time in 1993-94, and made their third National Championship appearance that season when Des Moines hosted the event.

During the 1994-1995 season, the Bucs topped their previous successes by winning the Triple Crown... both USHL Championships (Anderson and Clark) and the Jr. A National Championship!

Scott Owens joined the organization in 1995 when Ferguson left Des Moines to join the professional ranks (he is currently Head Coach and Director of Hockey Operations for the Florida Everblades of the ECHL). During his tenure with the Bucs, Owens led the team to 2 Anderson Cup Championships (1997-1998 and 1998-1999), 1 Clark Cup Championship (1999), and 1 National Jr. A Championship (1998) when the Buccaneers became the only Junior A team to win 3 National Championships in one decade. Owens' success ultimately led to his departure when he accepted the position of Head Coach at his alma mater, Colorado College.

Tom Carroll took over the head coaching position for the 1999-2000 season after 14 years as an assistant coach at the University of Notre Dame. With a mere 6 veteran players T.C. and Assistant Coach Nick Krueger led the team to a record of 40-24-3 and advanced to the second round of the Clark Cup playoffs falling just 1 victory short of playing for the championship in the finals.

HOCKEY LINGO



THE BASICS

"A": Letter worn on uniform of assistant team captain.

A5515T: Point awarded to a player for helping set up a goal, usually awarded to the last two men to handle the puck prior to the goal.

BACKCHECK: Description of efforts by forwards to hinder an opponent heading toward the defending zone.

BLUE LINES: The pair of one-foot wide lines which extend across the ice at a distance of 60 feet from each goal. These lines break the ice up into attacking, neutral and defending zones.

BODY CHECK: Use of the body to slow or stop an opponent with the puck or immediately after the opponent has passed or shot the puck.

BREAKAWAY: An offensive rush when there is no opponent between the puck carrier and the opposition's goalie.

BREAKOUT: When the attacking team comes out of its defensive zone with the puck and starts up ice.

"C": Letter worn on uniform of the team captain.

CHANGING ON THE FLY: When players on the ice switch with fresh players on the bench while the game is going on.

CREASE: The area immediately in front of the goal, which is marked by a shaded blue area in the shape of a semicircle. Offensive players are not allowed into this area unless the puck is in it.

CLEARING THE PUCK: When the puck is passed or shot away from the front of the net or other congested area.

DROP PASS: A sometimes dangerous play in which a puck carrier leaves the puck behind him to be picked up by a trailing teammate. When employed successfully, the puck carrier acts as a screen to give the teammate a clear path with the puck.

END-TO-END RUSH: When a player skates the puck from his own zone deep into the attacking zone.

FACE-OFF: The dropping of the puck to start or resume play by the referee or linesmen.

FORECHECK: To keep opponents in their end of the rink while tryin ontrast to his stick hand, which is the hand that the goalie holds his stick in.

GOAL LINE: The red line which runs between the goalposts and extends in both directions to the side boards.

GOAL MOUTH: The area just in front of the goal and crease.

HAT TRICK: Three goals scored by a player in one game.

HEADMAN: To pass the puck ahead to a teammate.

ICING: To shoot the puck from behind the center red line over the opponent's goal line.

MAJOR PENALTY: An infraction that calls for five minutes in the penalty box.

Usually involves fighting or dangerous use of the stick.

MINOR PENALTY: An infraction that calls for two minutes in the penalty box.

MISCONDUCT PENALTY: A 10-minute penalty called against a player, usually for use of abusive language. The team may substitute for the penalized player.

NEUTRAL ZONE: Center ice area between defending and attacking zones.

OFFSIDES: A situation that occurs when an attacking player precedes the puck into the attacking zone; play is resumed with a face-off.

PENALTY BOX: Off-ice area at the center red line across from the players benches where players serve their penalty time.

PENALTY SHOT: A situation in which the referee places the puck at center ice and a player is permitted to skate in alone on the opposing goalie. There are no stops or rebounds allowed. Primarily occurs when a player is penalized from behind with no one between him and the goalie.

POINT: A position just inside the opposition's blue line and close to the boards. Attacking defensemen usually take this position when their team is in control of the puck in the opposition's zone.

POKE CHECK: To dislodge the puck from the puck carrier by stabbing at it with the blade of the stick.

POWER PLAY: When a team has more players on the ice due to penalties to the other club.

PUCK: The vulcanized rubber disc which is whacked around the ice. It is frozen for several hours before game time to prevent it from bouncing.

PUCK CONTROL: When a player or team retains possession of the puck and dominates play.

SAVE: A shot blocked by the goaltender which would have gone into the net if not stopped.

SCREEN SHOT: A shot on goal when one or more of the players is between the shooters and the goalie, blocking the goalie's view of the shooter.

SLAP SHOT: A shot in which the shooter brings the stick back, then quickly forward, hitting the ice and the puck at the same time. Also one of the greatest movies in cinematic history.

\$LOT: The area immediately in front of the goal and goal crease. It is the spot where most goals are scored and where the most furious action takes place.

STICK HANDLING: Carrying the puck along the ice with the stick.

SWEEP CHECK: To use the entire length of the stick with a sweeping motion while laying it flat on the ice in order to dislodge the puck from the puck carrier.

WRIST SHOT: A shot that propels the puck off the blade of the stick with a flicking motion of the wrist.

ZAMBONI: The ice-resurfacing machine.

ADVANCED HOCKEY LINGO

BREEZERS: Hockey pants.

CHEAP-SHOT: A deliberate and unsportsman-like attempt to injure another player.

CHERRY PICKER: A player who hangs out near center ice and doesn't come back into his own defensive zone to help on defense.

COVER LIKE A BLANKET: Solid, close-checking defensive play that stifles the opposition.

DEKE: A fake move by a puck carrier to stickhandle his way around an opponent or to make the goalie move first.

DIVE: When a player exaggerates being hooked or tripped to try to draw a penalty.

FAKED OUT OF HIS JOCK: A common saying to describe when a player gets burned by a deke.

FIVE-HOLE: The opening between a goalie's leg pads.

FLOATER: A player who doesn't work hard. Usually an offensive player who hangs near center ice while his teammates do all the work on defensive (compare Cherry Picker).

GARBAGE GOAL: An easy goal scored when another player has done all the work or when the opposition's goalie is caught out of position.

GOON: A player whose role is to physically intimidate the opposition, oftentimes by fighting. Synonyms include 'enforcer', 'heavyweight', and 'policeman.'

GORDIE HOWE HAT TRICK: A goal, an assist, and a fight in the same game.

HOMER: A referee who favors the home team.

LUMBERJACK: A dangerous player who uses his stick as a weapon to injure other players.

ONE TIMER: When a player shoots immediately upon receiving the puck and without stopping the puck first.

SHADOW: When one team's player covers another team's player man-to-man. It's a common defensive strategy employed to curtail the effectiveness of a dangerous offensive player.

SOFT: A description of a player who avoids physical contact and won't take a check to make a play.

SUCKING WIND: Gasping for air. Occurs when a player stays on the ice too long and runs out of gas.

TWEENER: Goal scored through the goalie's leg pads.

ZEBRA: Synonym for referee.

POSITIONS

GOALTENDER

The goaltender's main responsibility is to keep the puck from entering the goal and there are no restrictions placed on the methods he can employ. His offensive contributions are limited and consist of occasionally passing the puck up to his defensemen or forwards to start a rush. A goaltender never scores a goal and only on rare occasions does he receive credit for an assist.

DEFENSEMAN


Basically, the two defensemen try to stop the incoming play at their own blue line. They also block shots, clear the puck from in front of their goal and watch the opposing forwards. Offensively, they carry the puck up the ice or pass the puck up to the forwards, then follow the play into the attacking zone and help to keep it there.

CENTER

The center operates mostly up and down the middle of the ice and usually leads his team's attack by carrying the puck. He sets up plays by exchanging passes to his two wingmen and tries to steer the play in towards the opponent's goal. Defensively, he tries to keep the play in the attacking zone by harassing the opponent's puck carrier (forechecking). After the opposition works the puck out of their end of the rink, he tries to interrupt their playmaking as it moves through the neutral zone and into his defending zone (backchecking).

WINGS

The two wings move up and down the sides of the rink with the direction of play. Offensively, they skate abreast of the center exchanging passes with him while positioning themselves for a shot on the goal. Defensively, they watch the opponent's wings and try to disrupt their playmaking and shooting as the action moves back towards the defending zone (backchecking).



PLAYS

OFFSIDE

A team is offside when any member of the attacking team precedes the puck carrier over the defending team's blue line. The position of the player's skates and not that of his stick is the determining factor.



If both skates are over the blue line before the puck, the player is offside. If he has only one skate over the blue line and one on it, he is onside.

OFFSIDE PASS


When a player passes the puck from his defending zone to a teammate beyond the center red line (thus crossing the blue line and the red line) it is an offside pass. The



position of the puck (not the player's skates in this case) is the determining factor in deciding from which zone the pass was made.

ICING THE PUCK

Icing the puck is not permitted when the teams are at equal numerical strength. Thus it is an infraction when a player on his team's side of the red center line shoots the puck all the way down the



ice, it crosses the red goal line at any point other than the goal itself and is first touched by a defending player. When this occurs, play is stopped and the puck is returned to the other end of the ice for a face-off in the offending team's zone.

ICING THE PUCK IS NOT CALLED

- A. If the goalie plays the puck by leaving his net.
- B. If the puck cuts across part of the goal crease.
- C. When a defending opponent, in the judgment of the linesman, could have played the puck before it crossed the red goal line.
- D. When an attacking player who was onside (in the same zone) when the puck was shot down the ice manages to touch it first.
- E. When a team is playing shorthanded because of a penalty or penalties.

ANSWERS to Common Hockey QUESTIONS



Q: What is the puck made of?

A: The puck is made of solid vulcanized rubber, three inches in diameter and one inch thick. It is frozen before entering play to make it "bounce" resistant. It weighs about six ounces.

Q: How fast does the puck travel?

A: Some slapshooters propel the puck between 90-100 mph. Speeds up to 120 mph have been recorded by some of the hardest shooters. Compounding the problems for goaltenders, frequently the puck will curve in flight much like a baseball.

Q: Can a puck be kicked into the net for a score?

A: Not kicked in intentionally, but a puck can be deflected off a skate, or off a player's body if no overt attempt is made to throw or kick it in.

Q: What about deflections?

A: Many people think that deflections are mere luck. Actually, however, players practice deflections constantly, standing off to the side of the nets, or in front, and deflecting the shot from outside to another area of the goal.

Q: How thick is the ice?

A: The best ice for pro hockey is usually held at 16 degrees fahrenheit for the proper hardness and is approximately 3/4" thick. The thicker the sheet of ice becomes, the softer and "slower" it is. Commercial ice shows perform on "warmer, slower" ice.

Q: How are the lines and markers applied to the ice?

A: The ice is built up to a 1/2" thickness by spraying water over the concrete floor, which has the freezing pipes embedded. Then the markings are painted on, after which additional water is sprayed to coat the markings and build the ice to prescribed thickness.

Q: What if an offensive player is in the crease (the red outline area in front of the nets) as a goal is scored?

A: If he is there under his own power, the goal is denied. However, if he was forced into the crease or held there by an opposing player, the goal stands. An offensive player may carry the puck into the crease and score (as in breakaway situations).

Q: Who gets the credit for an assist?

A: The last player, or players (not more than two), to touch the puck prior to the scoring of a goal. As an example, Ken Hammond steals the puck and passes it to Claudio Scremin, who carries it up the ice and passes it to Gary Emmons, who immediately centers to David Bruce who pokes it in for a goal. Here Claudio and Gary both are credited with assists.

Q: How big is the rink?

A: The standard size is 200' by 85'. Occasionally, some professional rinks vary slightly in size.

Q: What are the sticks made of?

A: Generally, northern white ash or rock elm. The handle is one piece and the laminated blade is affixed to it. Some players have recently gone to shafts made of composite materials such as graphite and aluminum.

Q: Are all sticks alike?

A: Far from it. Just as baseball players have their individually personalized bats, so too do hockey players have their "patterned" sticks. Flexibility, lie (blade angle), weight, etc., vary from player to player.

Q: How big is the goal?

A: The goal is six feet wide by four feet tall, curving from one to three feet deep. Pins anchor it to the ice.

Q: What is the hardest shot to stop?

A: The toughest shot is low (a few inches off the ice) to the stick side. Often goal-tenders will "cheat" to the stick side, presenting more net to their glove side (the easiest to protect).

Q: Who calls the penalties – the referee or the linesmen?

A: The referee calls penalties and has the ultimate responsibility for allowing (or disallowing) goals, even naming the goal-scorer if a question arises. The linesmen concen

trate mainly on calling offside and icing. A linesmen may call a misconduct penalty or ask the referee to hand one out if he thinks it is justified.

Q: Why doesn't the referee act more quickly to stop fights?

A: There are several reasons. For one, he is observing who should receive the penalties for the infractions. His primary responsibilities are: stay healthy, penalize participants accordingly, and to return order and control to the game in progress.

Q: What if the puck is stopped or stops on the goal line?

A: There is no score. The puck must completely clear the goal line between the posts to be counted as a score.

Q: What is a "hat trick"?

A: The term is now applied to a player scoring three goals in a single game. Originally it stood for three consecutive goals, with none scored in between by either team. The term is borrowed from cricket. In England, 1858, a bowler (like the pitcher) took three wickets with consecutive balls, an incredible trick. As a reward, his club gave him a new hat, hence the name.

REFEREE



Here's What They Mean...

BOARDING

Pounding the closed fist of one hand into the other. Called for driving opponent into boards.



HOLDING

Clasping the wrists in front of the chest. Called for using hands on opponent or his equipment.



SLASHING

Chopping with one hand across the opposite forearm. Called for swinging stick at the opponent.



CHARGING

Rotating clenched fists in front of chest. Called for taking more than 3 strides before checking opponent.



INTERFERENCE

Crossed arms in front of chest with fists closed.
Called for having contact with opponent not in possession of puck.



SPEARING

A jabbing motion with both hands in front of the body. Called for using the stick like a spear.



A forward and backward motion with fists extending from the chest. Called for hitting opponent with both hands on the stick & no part of stick on the ice.



Tugging motion with arms, as called for using stick or blade to hook opponent.



TRIPPING

Strike the right leg with the right hand below the knee. Called for using stick, arm, or leg to cause the opponent to trip or fall.



DELAYED CALLING OF PENALTY

Referee extends arm and points to penalized player until penalized team regains possession of puck.



KNEEING

Slapping the knee with palm of hand.
Called when using knee to impede opponent.



Both arms swung across the body with palms down. When used by the referee, it means goal disallowed; by the linesmen it means no off-side or icing.



Tapping the elbow with the opposite hand. Called when using elbow to impede opponent.



Place both hands on hips.
Called for various forms of misconduct or when a player incurs a second major penalty in a game.

UNSPORTSMAN-LIKE CONDUCT

Use both hands to form a "T" in front of the chest.



WASH-OUT

HIGH-STICKING

Holding both fists, clenched, one above the other at the side of the head. Called for carrying stick above shoulder against opponent.



ROUGHING

A thrusting motion with the arm extending from the side. Called for engaging in fisticuffs or shoving.



ICING

Linesmen's arms folded across the upper chest.



BUCCANEER Hall of Fame



JAMIE ADAMS

(Inducted 1998) After one season in Sioux City, Jamie followed Coach Bob Ferguson from the Musketeers to Des Moines in 1990. He played two outstanding seasons for the Buccaneers, which culminated in Des Moines' first National Championship in 1992. Jamie was the leading scorer on that team, with 92 points and eight game-winning goals. He was named to the first team USHL All-Stars in '92 and went on to a successful pro career.

REGGIE BERG

(Inducted 2000) A native of Anoka, MN, Reggie thrilled the Buccaneer crowds during the 1993-94 & 1994-95 seasons. A key member of the "Triple Crown team" Reggie notched a total of 102 points in his two seasons. He was rookie of the year in 1993-1994 and was voted the fans favorite player in 1994-95 as well as a member of the All USHL 2nd team before moving on to the University of Minnesota and then the pro ranks.

BEAU BILEK

Beau, like another former Buccaneer Scott Krueger, hails from Des Moines. He played two seasons of solid defense for the Buccaneers (1989-90 and 90-91.) He was a first team all-star in 1990-91, the same year he won the USHL's Curt Hammer Award for Outstanding Play and Sportsmanship. He was the first recipient of the Buccaneer Academic Achievement Award, as well as the Community Service Award in 1991. Beau starred four years at the United States Air Force Academy and was their captain during his senior season. He looks forward to a promising professional career with the Chicago Blackhawks organization.

JOHN BLUE

Even though John was injured for part of his only season in Des Moines (1983-84), he still made quite an impression. He held the Buccaneer single season record for goals-against average at 5.04 until the era of Bob Ferguson brought a more defensive approach to the game. From Des Moines John went on to have an outstanding hockey career, playing at the University of Minnesota; with the 1988 U.S. Olympic Team; and later in the Boston Bruins organization and parts of several seasons in the NHL.

DAVE COOPER

This outstanding goal keeper played for Des Moines in our opening season, 1980-81. He was an ironman in goal—playing in 41 of 48 games. He held the all-time single season wins record at 19 until the 1994-95 season when Mark Magliarditi won 20. "Coop" was a favorite of Des Moines fans and was selected as Most Popular Player.

PAUL ERICKSON

Paul played two seasons of solid defense for the Buccaneers (1983-84 & 1984-85). He was the Buccaneers' captain during his last playing season in Des Moines. He returned to serve as Assistant Coach under Head Coach Jim Wiley for the 1988-89 season. His help and support of the Youth Hockey Division of the Greater Des Moines Ice Sports Association was enjoyed and highly appreciated for many years.

BOB FERGUSON

(Inducted 2000) The driving force behind the Buccaneers for five seasons. "Fergy" compiled an amazing 170-57-13 record with Bucs and won six championships. Two Anderson Cups (1993-94, 1994-95), 2 Clark Cups (1991-92, 1994-95), and 2 National Championships (1991-92, 1994-95). The standard which Jr. coaches are measured against, Fergy moved on to the Indianapolis Ice in the IHL in 1995. Currently he is Head Coach and Director of Hockey Operations for the Florida Everblades of the ECHL where he has been voted Coach of the Year for the years 1998-1999 and 1999-2000.

BRAD FRATTAROLI

(Inducted 2000) "Frat" gave the Bucs 3 great seasons from 1992-93 to 1994-95. Brad scored 135 points in his career with the Buccaneers. Was voted team MVP on the 1994-95 Triple Crown Championship after leading the team in scoring with 72 points and was a member of the All USHL 1st team. Frat continued his hockey career at the University of Northern Michigan.

DON GEIGER

(Inducted 2000) The very first president of the Des Moines Buccaneers and still serves on the board today. It is his leadership and vision that has enabled the team to be the phenomenal success that it is today. That the Buccaneers are the only non-profit team in the league was largely by Don's and the other founder's design. By using the team's revenue to support youth hockey and other activatives the GDMISA has seen tremendous growth. The Buccaneers are proud to elect Don to the Hall of Fame and would like to publicly thank him for his service, both past and present.

CURT HAMMER

Curt served as president of the Des Moines Buccaneers for three seasons, ending his term in 1987. Part of his duties included representing the Buccaneers on the board of directors of the United States Hockey League, of which he also served as secretary. In honor of the outstanding volunteer, both the USHL and the Bucs have awards named in his honor.

SCOTT KRUEGER

A product of Des Moines Youth Hockey, Scott gave the Buccaneers three great seasons (1985-86, 1986-87, 1987-88). He was among the USHL's leading scorers in 1987-88. He furthered his playing career at Wisconsin-Stevens Point, leading them to consecutive NCAA Division III national championships. After graduation, Scott returned to Des Moines to coach the Des Moines Capitals high school hockey team and he is currently a travel coach with the Des Moines Amateur Hockey program.

BOB NARDELLA

Bobby played three seasons, from 1985 through 1988, for the Bucs. He was twice the team's leading scorer; in his final season he was also the leading scorer in the league. This flashy forward was named the Buccaneers Most Popular Player. In 1988 he was honored as the USHL's Best Forward and named to the league's All-Star Team. He still holds the Bucs' career record in assists (130), points (229) and game-winning goals (16). He played Division I hockey at Ferris State. His career extended to playing in the International Hockey League and professional in-line roller hockey.

IVAN PREDIGER

After completing his professional playing career in Des Moines, Mr. Prediger became the Buccaneers' first coach and general manager. His dedication and hard work were instrumental in developing the Bucs into a force to be reckoned with in the United States Hockey League.

MIKE REAL

Mike also played three seasons in Des Moines (1986 through 1989.) In his first season he received the Buccaneer Sportsmanship Award. He was selected as the Most Valuable Buccaneer in 1987-88 and 1988-89. He is the second leading Buccaneer career goal scorer with 107; all-time career short-handed goal scorer with 10. Mike was selected for the USHL second-team all-star teams in both 87-88 and 88-89.

ERIC RUD

(Inducted 1998) A native of Inver Grove Heights, MN, Eric gave Des Moines two stellar seasons at defense while scoring 81 points. A member of our 1992 National Championship team, he was a USHL All-Star in both '91-'92 and '92-'93. He was voted both Most Popular and Most Valuable Buccaneer in 1993. He continued his hockey career at Colorado College and then joined the pro ranks.

KELLY SANNER

(Inducted 1999) How do you keep fan interest alive while your team is mired in consecutive losing seasons? That's what Kelly did as a volunteer cheerleader for the mid-80s Buccaneers. Kelly delighted fans with his between-period antics while wearing a pirate's mask and Buc sweat suit. He now lives with his family in the Southwest.

DARYL SELTENREICH

Daryl played two seasons in Des Moines, 1981-82 and 1982-83. During that time, he: led the Bucs and the USHL in scoring in 82-83 with 53 goals and 93 points; was a first team all-star also in 82-83, as well as the Bucs Most Valuable Player; tied for all-time Buccaneer single season short-handed goals record, with 7. Daryl went on to play Division I hockey in his home town at Denver University.

Some Hockey Info For Our NEW Fans



OBJECT OF THE GAME

Above all, the object is to put the puck in the other team's goal and keep it out of your goal. It can be put in with a stick, bounded in off a player on either team, or knocked in by the goaltender. It cannot be kicked in, or batted in with a high stick.

TO START THE GAME

The game starts when the referee drops the puck at center ice between the two centers. This is called a "Face-off." The game is now under way. Next, we look at what the players can and cannot do to move the puck towards the goal.

THE RINK

Ice hockey is played on an ice surface known as the "Rink." The official size is 200' long x 85' wide. It is surrounded by boards four feet high with shatter-proof glass on top of the boards. The Red and Blue lines divide the rink into three zones: offensive, neutral and defensive. There is a goal at each end of the ice.

THE GOAL NETS

A goal net, or cage, is six feet wide and four feet high. It is designed so that pucks entering the net will stay in, though occasionally a shot will rebound off a back post and carom out. The goal line itself is two inches wide.

In front of each goal: the goal crease. It's drawn by a red line a foot outside each goal post and four feet out, a rectangle designed to minimize traffic in front of the goalie.

And behind each goal sits a goal judge whose only responsibility is to decide whether the puck crosses the goal line in front of him. If it does, he pushes a button which lights up the red lamp overhead.

SCORING

Scoring a goal is the so-called name of the game. It is not necessary to shoot the puck into the netting behind the goalie to score. If the entire puck crosses the goal line inside the posts, it's a goal:

- (a) Unless an attacking player kicks the puck, or throws the puck, or otherwise deliberately directs the puck into the goal by any means other than the stick.
- (b) Unless an attacking player is in the goal crease, and is in no way held by a defender, while a teammate "scores."

While a goal does not count if it is kicked in by an attacker, if that same attacker kicks it in off a defender other than the goalie, it does count. In this case, the kicker is credited with the goal. On the other hand, if a shot is deflected in off a teammate, the teammate gets credit for the goal and the shooter gets an assist.

No more than two assists shall be credited on any goal, and those assists go to the two players who handle the puck immediately preceding the goal.

EQUIPMENT

Hockey sticks, like baseball bats, are lighter than they used to be. Also more flexible, with more whip action. They're made of northern white ash or rock elm. Sticks may not exceed 58 inches from heel to the end of the shaft.

A goalie's pads can't be as wide as he might like them to be, not more than ten inches wide, and the blade of a goalie's stick shall not exceed three and a half inches, except at the heel, where it can be an extra inch wide.

All protective equipment except gloves, headgear and goalkeeper's leg guards must be worn under the uniform. Much of this is cushioned with foam rubber.

GAME OFFICIALS

The referee controls the game. He calls all the penalties and must decide the legality of goals, though sometimes he will call time and ask his linemen for an opinion before he makes a final decision.

The duty of the linemen is to determine offsides and icings. They drop the puck for faceoffs. They chase the pucks after stoppage of play. And it is their unenviable job to break up fights while the referee assesses the penalties.

THE METRO ICE SPORTS FACILITY



he Metro Ice Sports Facility, located at 5100 72nd Street, is the cornerstone of the Urbandale Winter Park. The "Facility" opened its doors to the general public in January of 1996. The Facility, like the Metro Ice Sports Arena, "home of the Buccaneers," is owned and operated by the Greater Des Moines Ice Sports Association, a not-for-profit organization.

The Metro Ice Sports Facility was designed to meet the growing needs of the Association's member division groups and also allow the organization to continue to meet its commitment to the community. The Metro Ice Sports Facility is devoted to youth hockey, figure skating, public skating, ice rentals for groups, and the expansion of the Association's existing programs for the physically challenged and disadvantaged youth and adults of the Greater Des Moines area. The Des Moines Buccaneers players and coaching staff volunteer their time each week during the season to the programs sponsored by the Greater Des Moines Ice Sports Association. The staff at the Metro Ice Sports Facility wishes the Buccaneers the best of luck for the 2000-01 season. LET'S GO BUCS!






